# MARY DONALDSON MEMORIAL LECTURE

The Mary Donaldson Memorial Trust was established in 1966 to honour the memory of Mary Donaldson, who was Saskatchewan's first Provincial Librarian from 1951 until her death in 1966. SLA established the Mary Donaldson Memorial Lecture Series in May 1967. The lectures are given annually by leaders in the field of library science or related fields. While the lectures are designed primarily for librarians in the province, they are open to the public in the belief that library trustees and friends of the libraries will also find them thought-provoking and challenging. The Mary Donaldson Award of Merit was established in 1977 to provide a bursary to a full-time or part time Saskatchewan student who enrolls at the Library and Information Management Program at Saskatchewan Polytechnic in Saskatoon.

The Mary Donaldson Fund, which finances both the Lecture series and the Award, is supported yearly by individual members of the Association, library boards, library associations, library trustees and friends of Mary Donaldson. With support such as this, the lectures have become a permanent and valuable part of the continued expansion of library services in Saskatchewan.



# **AWARDS & LECTURES**

#### MAUREEN WOODS EDUCATION BURSARY

This \$5000 bursary was made possible by a generous donation from the Saskatchewan Provincial Library & Literacy Office (a branch of the Ministry of Education) and through the efforts of the Multitype Library Board and the Saskatchewan Library Association (SLA). Established in 2002, this bursary was created to promote the continued growth of professional librarianship in the province of Saskatchewan. The Saskatchewan Library Association is honoured to administer this bursary.





#### MARY DONALDSON MEMORIAL LECTURE AND AWARD OF MERIT

The Mary Donaldson Memorial Trust was established in 1966 to honour the memory of Mary Donaldson, who was Saskatchewan's first Provincial Librarian from 1951 until her death in 1966. SLA established the Mary Donaldson Memorial Lecture Series in May 1967. The lectures are given annually by leaders in the field of library science or related fields. While the lectures are designed primarily for librarians in the province, they are open to the public in the belief that library trustees and friends of the libraries will also find them thought-provoking and challenging. The Mary Donaldson Award of Merit was established in 1977 to provide a bursary to a full-time or part time Saskatchewan student who enrolls at the Library and Information Management Program at Saskatchewan Polytechnic in Saskatoon.

The Mary Donaldson Fund, which finances both the Lecture series and the Award, is supported yearly by individual members of the Association, library boards, library associations, library trustees and friends of Mary Donaldson. With support such as this, the lectures have become a permanent and valuable part of the continued expansion of library services in Saskatchewan.



#### **SLTA LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD**


The Saskatchewan Library Trustees' Association (SLTA) confers an Honorary Lifetime Membership to a member or past member of the SLTA to recognize distinguished service as a trustee in the library field at the local, provincial, or national level. The Honorary Lifetime Achievement Award was initiated in 1975 and since then has been awarded to many worthy individuals who have contributed to the establishment and maintenance of Saskatchewan's one-province public library system, which is the envy of the country.




#### **SLA FRANCES MORRISON AWARD**

Frances Morrison joined the staff of the Saskatoon Public Library in 1943 and was the Chief Librarian from 1961 to 1980. During the time she was with the library, she saw the library staff grow from 13 to more than 90. As Chief Librarian she directed the construction of two new branches, including the branch that bears her name. In 1981 she was awarded the Canadian Library Association's Outstanding Service to Librarianship Award. In 1999 she received the Saskatchewan Order of Merit for her contributions to library services in Saskatchewan. In 1982, Frances Morrison joined with SLA in creating this award. The SLA Frances Morrison Award is an award of merit for outstanding service to libraries given in the name of one of Saskatchewan's exceptional librarians. This award is open to all individuals, institutions or groups, and is not restricted to professional librarians or SLA members.

He uses a broad range of mediums to accomplish this. Almost all of the Dene language written documents that have emerged since 1992 have all been authored by him. He has done work for all levels of government and industry. One of the hardest jobs Allan does is simultaneous translations. He has translated for the Royal Commission on Aboriginal peoples, the Residential school TRC process and more. Both Allan and Cathy Wheaton have been working on a web page since 2008. Technology helps us build our languages, he says.



**LINDA AKSOMITIS** Linda Aksomitis is a member of the Saskatchewan Children's Writers' Round Robin, a group of 12 children's writers who are Saskatchewan residents, or past residents. Together for more than 30 years, this group has produced more than a hundred award winning and internationally published books for young readers.



**JENNIFER BAETZ** Jennifer Baetz is originally from London, Ontario. Jennifer moved to Saskatoon in late 2013 after completing her MLIS (University of Western Ontario). She worked at London Public Library for over seven years as a page and library assistant. Jennifer is a former professional musician and educator, having spent fifteen yearsas a freelance flutist and private music teacher. Her strong background in music aids in her in current position as Fine Arts Librarian at Saskatoon Public Library. In her free time, Jennifer enjoys running, cycling, and subversive cross stitch.

Cathy also researches methods of teaching Cree comprehension and speaking skills versus literacy as Cree is largely still an oral language within communities.

LI ZHANG Li Zhang is the Head of the Science and Engineering Libraries of the University of Saskatchewan. Her research interests include bibliometrics, altmetrics, information literacy, and collection development.





















