# 2016 Mary Donaldson Memorial Lecture LINDSAY KNIGHT

Indigenous Conceptualizations of Creativity

MAY 5, 2016 | 7 p.m. - 8:30 p.m.

Lindsay Knight (aka Eekwol) is an award winning hip hop performing artist living in Saskatoon. Originally from Muskoday First Nation, Lindsay successfully completed her Master's Degree at the University of Saskatchewan, while continuing her many years of dedication to hip hop by creating something unique and astounding to give back to the community.

Eekwol uses her music and words to spread messages of resistance, revolution and keeping the language, land and culture alive for the next generations. Through her original sound she displays her activist roots by living and creating as a supporter of both hip hop and indigenous culture and rights. Along with music and academic work, Eekwol frequently works with young people across the country as a mentor and helper. She achieves this through performances, workshops, speaking events, conferences and programs.











The Mary Donaldson Memorial Trust was established in 1966 to honour the memory of Mary Donaldson, who was Saskatchewan's first Provincial Librarian from 1951 until her death in 1966. SLA established the Mary Donaldson Memorial Lecture Series in May 1967. The lectures are given annually by leaders in the field of library science or related fields. While the lectures are designed primarily for librarians in the province, they are open to the public in the belief that library trustees and friends of the libraries will also find them thought-provoking and challenging.

Mary Elizabeth Donaldson was born in Brandon, Manitoba in 1908. She received a B.A. from the University of Alberta in 1928 and a B.Sc. in Library Science from the University of Toronto in 1929. She started her professional career as a cataloguer in Toronto and Edmonton Public Libraries, and the University of Saskatchewan, where she served briefly as chief cataloguer before transferring to Saskatoon Public Library as chief assistant librarian in 1945. In 1948, she headed a group of Canadian librarians attending the International Summer School for Librarians in Manchester, England. Thereafter, she maintained a keen interest in library development throughout the world and was an active participant in library association affairs at all levels. From 1951 until her death in 1966, she held the position of Provincial Librarian for Saskatchewan. She also served as President of the Canadian Library Association from 1956 to 1957.

The Lecture will be held at the Radisson Hotel Saskatoon in Michelangelo A&B, beginning at 7 p.m. and will include a performance. The President's Reception will follow.

#### Maureen Woods Education Bursary



This \$5000 bursary was made possible by a generous donation from the Saskatchewan Provincial Library & Literacy Office (a branch of the Ministry of Education) and through the efforts of the Multitype Library Board and the Saskatchewan Library Association (SLA). Established in 2002, this bursary was created to promote the continued growth of professional librarianship in the province of Saskatchewan. The (SLA) is honoured to administer this bursary.

#### Mary Donaldson Memorial Lecture



The Mary Donaldson Award of Merit was established in 1977 to provide a bursary to a full-time or part time Saskatchewan student who enrolls at the Library and Information Management Program at Saskatchewan Polytechnic in Saskatoon. The Mary Donaldson Memorial Trust was established in 1966 to honour the memory of Mary Donaldson, who was Saskatchewan's first Provincial Librarian from 1951 until her death in 1966. SLA established the Mary Donaldson Memorial Lecture Series in May 1967. The lectures are given annually by leaders in the field of library science or related fields. While the lectures are designed primarily for librarians in the province, they are open to the public in the belief that library trustees and friends of the libraries will also find them thought-provoking and challenging.

The Mary Donaldson Fund, which finances both the Lecture series and the Award, is supported yearly by individual members of the Association, library boards, library associations, library trustees and friends of Mary Donaldson. With support such as this, the lectures have become a permanent and valuable part of the continued expansion of library services in Saskatchewan.

#### SLTA Lifetime Achievement Award

The Saskatchewan Library Trustees' Association (SLTA) confers an Honorary Lifetime Membership to a member or past member of the SLTA to recognize distinguished service as a trustee in the library field at the local, provincial, or national level. The Honorary Lifetime Achievement Award was initiated in 1975 and since then has been awarded to many worthy individuals who have contributed to the establishment and maintenance of Saskatchewan's one-province public library system, which is the envy of the country.



#### SLA Frances Morrison Award

Frances Morrison joined the staff of the Saskatoon Public Library in 1943 and was the Chief Librarian from 1961 to 1980. During the time she was with the library, she saw the library staff grow from 13 to more than 90. As Chief Librarian she directed the construction of two new branches, including the branch that bears her name. In 1981 she was awarded the Canadian Library Association's Outstanding Service to Librarianship Award. In 1999 she received the Saskatchewan Order of Merit for her contributions to library services in Saskatchewan. In 1982, Frances Morrison joined with SLA in creating this award. The SLA Frances Morrison Award is an award of merit for outstanding service to libraries given in the name of one of Saskatchewan's exceptional librarians. This award is open to all individuals, institutions or groups, and is not restricted to professional librarians or SLA members.



#### SSLA Awards and Bursary

The Saskatchewan School Library Association, a special subject council of the Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation proudly offers annual awards and a bursary to individuals who demonstrate leadership and distinguished service to school libraries.

#### Dr. Alixe Hambleton Bursary

The Saskatchewan School Library Association offers annually, a bursary valued at \$500.00 to a student registered at a recognized Canadian University in an undergraduate or graduate program in Education with the award to be used for a course in school librarianship. The student selected for the award must be a resident of Saskatchewan. The award is based on academic achievement and financial need.

#### Art Forgay Award of Recognition of Administrators

The Saskatchewan School Library Association annually presents an award to recognize a school-based or central office-based administrator who has direct responsibility for a school or group of schools, and who has demonstrated commitment toward establishing or developing an effective school library program.

#### Connie Acton Award of Merit

The Saskatchewan School Library Association, a special subject council of the Saskatchewan Teachers' Federation, recognizes individuals who have made a significant contribution to school library service in Saskatchewan.

The Connie Acton Award of Merit recognizes the contribution and effort of those individuals who have worked towards making the association an effective agency for the promotion of sound school library development


